METHODOLOGY

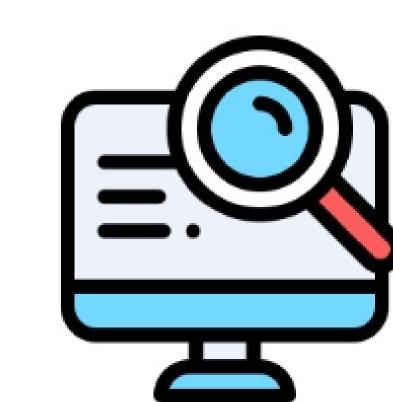
Course Guide Testing

- Develop a search strategy and find an article
- Find information about types of information sources
- Comment on quality and quantity of information and overall experience when using guide



- Find information on proper citation
- Find information on academic misconduct
- Use Ulrich's to determine if articles are peer-reviewed
- Find out what constitutes primary sources and how to find and use them
- Rate the overall experience, clarity, helpfulness and likelihood of using guide

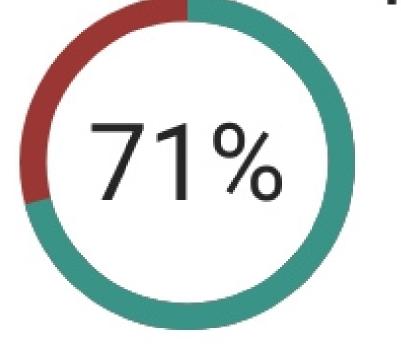

QUALITATIVE FINDINGS

Participants liked:

- Information presented visually in a variety of formats
- Easy access to resources they are familiar with (i.e. library catalogue, Owl of Purdue)
- Many examples
- Step-by-step instructions

Participants struggled to:

- Closely follow the LibGuide as most already had a preestablished research process
- Navigate to correct pages when tab and content labels were inconsistent or vague
- Identify information hidden lower on the page or within the hierarchy of tabs

RECOMMENDATIONS

Include:

- Tables, videos, screenshots and other graphics
- Closed captioning or transcripts for video content
- Links to helpful resources and top databases
- At least two examples for any new concept

Consider:

- Potential challenges of using any database included in the guide
- Shorter lists of steps to reduce scrolling
- Student workflow when deciding order of content and tabs
- Consistency and specificity of labels
