- This acts as a great introductory activity for new families so that they can get to know their library better, as well as creating parent-child bonding
- They get a marker and a laminated sheet with pictures of library staples such as the LEGO table, washrooms etc.

Once completed, ask for a ballot at the Circulation Desk!

- The goal of the program is to decipher the secret code
- Based on the clues on the sheets, patrons are led to an area of the library where they see a symbol
- They have to translate the symbol into a letter
- Once the secret code has been solved, participant shows Library Staff and receives a ballot
- It is a more time consuming activity so it is best used for class visits or could be incorporated as part of a larger program!

- Interactive wall display
- Participants guess the characters on the display and fill out a ballot
- Strategically put up some books featuring the characters in the Library as gentle hints
- Make ballots available for kids to fill out
- Use the paper size 11 x 17 as your guide otherwise the characters will be difficult to see from far away
- We usually do a mix of Picture Book characters and Junior Chapter Book characters so that it is fair to both really little ones and the elementary school aged children

GUIDELINES

1000 BOOKS BEFORE KINDERGARTEN

Supplies Needed:

- Prizes (dependent on budget)
- Log book
- Wall display
- Registration form
- Posters

GUIDELINES

- The goal of the program is for children to have read 1000 books by the December of the year that he/she enters kindergarten
- When the child registers for the program they receive a registration package which includes a brochure containing more information about the program, a logbook and a suggested reading guide
- After every 25 books, patrons can come in to receive a sticker, for 100, 200, 300, 400, 500, 600, 700, 800, 900 and 1000 books read there are specific prizes
- We also had a wall display with their name to denote which milestone they have achieved

HIDE & SEEK

Supplies Needed:

- Ballots
- Ballot Box
- Poster
- A specified number of character cut-outs



- Choose a character from a popular children's book series (Pete the Cat, the Mouse from *If You Give a Mouse a Cookie*, the Grinch, Llama Llama etc).
- Print off character (usually about 2.70-3" tall), the number of times desired (usually I try to do an odd number just to throw them off—like 9, 11 or 14)
- Participants wander around the Library seeing how many they can find (we put some in easier and harder spots)
- Affixed with Scotch tape to shelves and other parts of the library
- Once participants think that they have found all of them, they fill out a ballot with their final count

GUIDELINES

- Hide Mack the Moose (stuffed toy moose) in a location in the library
- Kids have to walk around the Library to find him
- When they do, they fill out a ballot with their name, age, phone number and where they found him!
- Normally he's out for 1 week and then put away, but we have done a month-long program where he switches spots each week
- Mack is brought out for Summer Reading Club, Canadian Library Month, Winter Break and March Break!

I Spy with My **FROZEN** Eye!



- The objective is to find all the characters with their associated letters so that the secret code is revealed (Winter Wishes) - this would be really easy to change up the theme (Despicable Me, Toy Story, Zootopia etc.)
- Children mark the found letters on their sheet
- The characters are hidden all throughout the Children's Department, it's a great way to get kids looking in all parts of the Library, and to let them discover something new!
- Once completed, the children show Library Staff the completed sheet and they receive a ballot for a chance to win a prize
- We laminate our sheets and put out Washable Markers so that they can be reused and easily cleaned!
